


- There are 340 DXCC entities, some are located in remote, uninhabited places
- Hams can earn an operating award for working (talking to) and confirming 100
- All Hams want to "work them all" at least once
- Many are on only once every 10 to 15 years

- Collect QSL Cards or Postage Stamps















Why QSL?


- Collect QSL Cards
 - Keep in Albums
 - Frame Favorite Cards
 - Make a Screen Saver with your Favorite Cards
- Earn Operating Awards Certificates and Plaques
 - ARRL DXCC, WAS, VUCC
 - CQ WAZ, WPX
- Other Awards:
 - JARL (Japan), RSGB (UK), SARL (South Africa), WIA (Australia), WAE (Worked All Europe) and others




Start with a QSL Card

 - Used by many DXpeditions

 - He will help you to create a good design
- KB3IFH Randy Dorman
 - Domestic –in Maryland <u>http://kb3ifh.homestead.com/</u>
 - QSL Cards for 13 Colonies Special Event
- Information to include
 - Name, Callsign, Address, Email
 - Grid Square, CQ & ITU Zone
 - IOTA if applicable
 - QSO info: Date, UTC, Band, Mode, RST
 - Can make back blank and use logger to print info








There Are Many Options...

- LoTW or eQSL online services
 - Costs \$\$ to use confirmed QSOs for award credit



- ClubLog check logs and order QSLs via Direct or Buro
 - Charge \$\$ for Direct QSL, "Buro" is usually free
 - There are other online QSL services as well (ex. M0OXO)
- Direct QSL send your card with SAE and return postage (green stamps)
 - Postal theft can be a problem
 - Can get expensive
- QSL "Buro" least expensive but slow
 - Good for confirming less important contacts
- Always begin by checking QSL "route" & options www.qrz.com



LoTW is ARRL service (must be a member to use confirmations)

13 Colonies NH (K2K/QRP)

- Accepted for ARRL awards and a few others (ex. some CQ awards)
- Upload contacts via a LoTW tool (Tqsl)

N1FD/VE9 - CANADA

- Register your call sign(s) and get a "certificate" from LoTW
- Configure your operating locations and match to call signs
- Can accomplish upload from most loggers directly (best way)
- eQSL simpler (setup calls/QTHs on website, upload adif file)
 - Accepted for eQSL and some CQ awards only

QSL'ingClubLog

- Most DXpeditions and many active DX stations are using ClubLog to QSL
- Can check to see if you are "in the log"
 - Good to do a day or two after working a DXpedition....
- Order cards direct (\$\$) or via
 Buro
- Upload your logs so others can check them
 - No QSL, Buro, Direct are all options
- Include your log on your QRZ page – ex. N1FD

QSL'ingDirect Mail



- Most stations support direct QSL'ing
- You must take steps to avoid postal theft
 - Use a secure envelope system
 - Properly package your "Green Stamps"
 - Tape outer envelope properly
- Be sure to check QSL route, manager, and return postage requirements before sending
- Can get expensive Figure ~\$4-5 for each successful confirmation

Via QSL Bureau



- Actually, there are two Bureaus Outgoing and Incoming
- Many but not all countries are part of the "Buro" system check first as not all DX stations accept Buro cards
- Outgoing Bureau used to send cards to other countries
 - There is a fee \$2 for 10 or fewer cards; \$3 for 11-20 cards; 75 cents/oz for >20 cards
 - Must pre-sort cards properly
 - http://www.arrl.org/outgoing-qsl-service
- Incoming Bureau (we use the W1 Buro) sort incoming cards and deliver them to HAMs who have an active account http://www.w1qsl.org/
 - There is a fee currently \$0.10/oz plus \$0.10 service fee
- Takes time but can be cost effective if you want to QSL many DX contacts

When All Else Fails...



- Make sure you have the correct current QSL route
- You can try using registered mail if you think you are a victim of postal theft – this is \$\$\$\$
- You can try emailing the DX station to confirm that you are in their log and to work out a special QSL arrangement ...
 - Example for first Iran contact sent \$25 via online service (\$5 for postage + \$20 for "local service fees" ...)
- Keep working those needed DX entities until one confirms...

How long will it take?

Buro: Figure 1-2 years

• **Direct QSLs:** 2 – 6 months

• ClubLog/Other Online QSL Services: 1-2 months

LoTW/eQSL: Varies, many will be within a few days





- See results when your make improvements to your station
- Decorate your shack

An Entry Level DX Award


Worked all Continents

- IARU Award
- Good goal for a new ham
- Requires QSL Cards
- One contact from each continent
 - North America, Europe fairly easy
 - Africa Canary Islands, EA8 is fairly easy to work Western Sahara – SOS
 - Oceania Hawaii, Australia, New Zealand
 - South America Aruba P4 and Curacao, PJ2 are on the air in most major contests, 9Y Trinidad and Tobago
 - Asia closest are middle eastern countries Turkey, Israel, Kuwait, Cyprus, Oman, etc.

ARRL Worked All States


- Mixed WAS
 - One contact from each state
 - Any band or mode
- 5 Band WAS (Plaque)
 - One contact from each state
 - 10m, 15m, 20m, 40m and 80m
 - Endorsements for 6m, 12m, 17m, 30m, 160m
- WAS Triple Play (Plaque)
 - Work each state on CW, Digital, and SSB
 - All contacts confirmed on LoTW
- Can also get certificates for WAS on single band or single mode
- ARRL Accepts QSL Cards or LoTW confirmations can be combined


The Premier Operating Award


- Mixed DXCC is the starting point –
 100 DXCCs on any band or mode
- Confirmations via combination of QSL Cards and LoTW
- Many options for additional DXCC awards
 - Single Band DXCC
 - Single Mode DXCC
 - DXCC Challenge work 1000 band points
 - Endorsements for each additional 500 band points up to 2500
 - 5 Band DXCC 100 DXCCs on each of 10m, 15m, 20m, 40m, and 80m
 - Endorsements for 6m, 12m, 17m, 30m, 160m
- Need a DXCC Card Checker to verify all QSL cards
 - Send cards to ARRL
 - Find a local card checker see arrl.org
 - Card checkers can be at Ham Conventions Boxboro, Dayton, etc.

VHF/UHF Century Club






- Confirm contacts with at least 100 Maidenhead Grid Squares on a VHF or UHF Band
- Most common are 50 MHz, Satellite, 144 MHz
 - Endorsements for each additional 25 credits
- For 432 MHz, need to work 50 Grid Squares
- Confirmation can be LoTW or QSL Cards
- "Fred Fish Memorial Award" award for confirming all 488 Grid Squares in the 48 continuous United States on 6 Meters (there have only been 9 Recipients)

CQ Awards


Worked all Zones – WAZ Worked all Prefixes - WPX



- Worked All Zones Award Confirm contacts in all 40 CQ Zones
 - Mixed
 - Any Single Band or Mode
 - 5 Band WAZ
- Worked all Prefixes Award (WPX) Awards for confirming contacts with different Callsign Prefixes (AB1, KC1, etc)
 - Can use LoTW, eQSL or cards to confirm
 - Certificates for 400 mixed, 300 CW, SSB or Digital Prefixes
 - Endorsements for Bands and Continents
 - Award of Excellence Plaque for all of 100 prefixes Mixed and 600 SSB and 600 CW and all 6 continents and all 5 non-WARC bands


