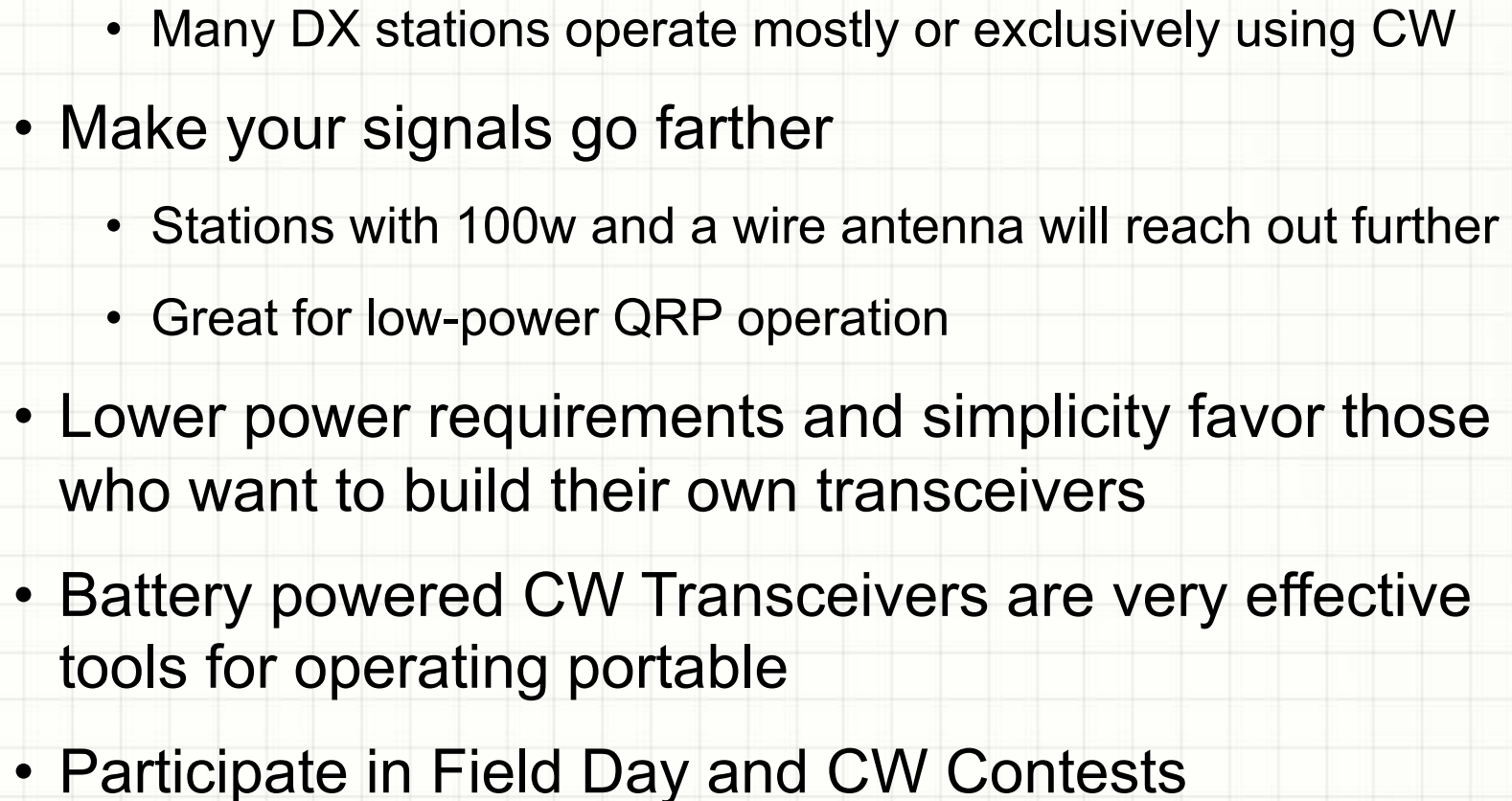

How to Go About Learning CW?

- Learning CW is like learning a new language
 - You need to invest time to learn
- Learning CW is a bit like learning to play an instrument – you'll do best if you learn to play as you learn to listen
 - You'll need a set of paddles, a Keyer, and practice oscillator
- Learning CW is about learning the sounds of letters and words – throw away your table of Dots and Dashes!
 - "Sound-alike" shortcuts will also severely limit your speed
- A computer with Internet access opens the door to some excellent learning and practice tools
- Get on the air and make slow speed CW contacts as soon as you can – near the top of the CW sub-bands



Gear for Learning CW

A Practice Keyer/Decoder like the K1EL K44 can help you practice timing



CW Paddles

- Choose a “repeatable” set
- Plan to spend about \$150 - \$200 for your first paddles



CW Keyer (or use your transceiver)

- Built-in small speaker for practice
- External oscillator is required to drive headphone/powered speaker



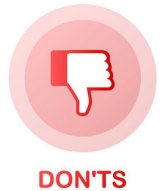
Headphones & Powered Speaker

- Practice oscillator will be needed for use with a Keyer
- Inexpensive units are fine
- Also needed for online CW courses



Learning CW

Some Do's and Don'ts



- **Do** spend 60 mins a day on practice
 - Plan to practice 6 – 8 weeks to get to about 10-12 WPM
 - Break your practice time into 15 – 30 min. sessions (2 – 3 per day)
 - Protect your practice times and stick with it!
- **Don't** learn using “dots” and “dashes” or use “sound-alike” systems
 - These approaches will severely limit your ability to build speed beyond 10 wpm or so
 - Avoid counting dots and dashes
 - Focus on developing **Instant Character Recognition**
- **Do** use the Farnsworth Method (15 – 20 wpm Character Speed/5 wpm Farnsworth Speed)
- **Do** practice at speeds 3 – 5 wpm faster than your 100% recognition speed
- **Do** learn simple words and phrases as soon as you can
 - Start word practice as soon as you learn a handful of letters
 - CQ, de, ur, 5NN, 599, tu, 73, SK, your callsign, your name, common words like “is”, “the”, “and”, “ant”, “rig”, “pwr”, “qth”, “hw”, ...
 - Begin learning numbers and common punctuation (ex. “/”, “?”, “.”) early
- **Do** send using a set of paddles and a Keyer from the beginning

Learning CW

Some Do's and Don'ts continued



- **Do** use your computer and the Internet as practice tools
- **Do** practice and learn proper character, word and sentence spacing
 - What you don't send is just as important as what you do send...
- **Do** record your sending practice - listen and note areas where you have trouble sending to help you focus on what to practice
 - Make a list of your “problem letters” and focus your practice there
- **Do** practice hearing callsigns once you know the alphabet & numbers
- **Do** learn the structure of a QSO & practice QSOs as soon as you can
- **Do** get on the air & make slow-speed contacts as soon as you can
 - Learn the basics of making contacts and have some fun!
- ***Don't*** get stuck in a single practice format – change it up
- **Do** sign up for an online CW class – ***CW Academy*** is a great choice
- ***Don't*** rely on computer decoders to get started on the air
 - Use your ears and brain instead and develop your skills via practice

- Regular practice coupled with expert coaches and online group practice
- Built upon effective online learning techniques
 - Many good practice tools and training scripts
 - Helps you avoid developing habits which will limit you
